Some other newsworthy items from the net:

The British Library has recently added the Lindisfarne Gospels and the Old English Hexateuch to their digitized Manuscript site. One of the most famous of medieval manuscripts, the 8th century Lindisfarne Gospels are known for their intricate Celtic scrollwork and miniatures of the four evangelists, Matthew, Mark, Luke and John. The Old English Hexateuch was made some three centuries later and contains the text of the first six books of the Bible, along with many illustrated biblical scenes. For the brewers and wine makers among us, scientists have found evidence of the **oldest known wine mak**ing operation in existence, about 6,100 years old, in an Armenian cave. The find contained both equipment for wine making as well as pressed grapes, stems, and shriveled grapevines. Residue indicates red wine was produced at the site. Video of the Month

This month we tale you to the Victoria and Albert Museum in London for their video on *A Tale of Two Raphaels*. Back in the early 16th century, Raphael painted a series of cartoons to be woven into tapestries for the Sistine Chapel. He died less than a year after the tapestries were completed and never lived to see a side by side comparison. When the uncle found out of their affair, all hell broke loose. While Abelard's letters tend to be rather professorial and preachy, Heloise generally allowed her pen to speak from her heart.

Museum Exhibits of Interest:

While some basic information gets reprinted every month, be sure to read the fine print! The highlighted events section has new information in every issue. In these tough economic times, remember to check with museums to see if they have any options for free admission. Many local museums have free or reduced ad-



mission prices at specified hours, and many Suffolk libraries offer free passes for admission to specific museums on specific days. Check with your local librarian for further details or do a quick search on the Suffolk Web: <u>http://suffolk.lib.ny.us</u>/ Enter 'museum passes' in the search field to find out if your library offers passes.

We are lucky enough to live near Manhattan, home to some of the world's most beautiful Medieval and Early Renaissance art. Did you know that the Metropolitan Museum web site allows you not only to

check out its calendar of events online, but also has a function that will send you an automatic email to remind you of the specific events you're interested in? Simply go to the calendar page, check on a program of interest, and then at the bottom of the entry you will see a box that asks if you'd like a reminder. Every so often, the Met features conversations with specific curators that allow the public to interact with art experts. Rather than straight lecture, these presentations allow you to chat with the experts as they speak about their favorite objects in the collections. This month we've got a unique opportunity to chat with **Timo-thy Husband**, **curator**, **Department of Medieval Art and The Cloisters** on **Friday**, **February 4 from 2-2:20 PM**. While this particular talk is on a weekday, it is free along with museum admission - great for students!

From **February 4- May 1, 2011**, the **Morgan Library and Museum** will host *The Changing Face of William Shakespeare*, featuring the Cobbe portraits of William Shakespeare and his patron, the Earl of Southampton. The Cobbe portrait is thought to be one of the earliest depictions of the Bard, painted in his lifetime. This is the first time the two portraits can be seen side by side in the United States. http://www.themorgan.org/exhibitions/exhibition.asp?id=44

Finally, **Google** has just launched a new web function that not only allows you to tour some of the world's greatest museums, but also includes super detailed HD photos of some of their major artworks. Creetings from Ateño & Lassar!

Primary focus on Study and Construction of Men's Tudor Garb (early 1500's), Costuming, Archery, Bureaucratic Service." Knowing Wulstan for longer than he was in the SCA, Ateno became fast friends with him and we were both pleased to see each other at events in our Kingdom. He had not been very active lately, but members of the Barony always kept in touch with him. We will miss him and his influence and guiding hand. After consultation with a few members of the Barony and past champions we have decided to cancel our official 'Great Trip' to the 'Balfar's Challenge' event in April.
